ACE: 20 years of looking out for **Nebraskans**

Board recently approved \$250,000 distribution return

ACE, the Public Alliance for Community Energy, will mark its 20th year of participating as a natural gas supplier in the Nebraska Choice Gas program in April.

ACE formed out of a strong desire by a small group of communities to provide competitive natural gas rates, local control and a possible revenue return to Nebraska communities. Those remain as ACE cornerstones today.

"PACE will ensure competition in the marketplace and give communities the chance to exercise control over natural gas prices," said the late Gary Lay, director of member services and marketing, back in 1998 when ACE (formerly known as PACE) began.

Shortly after forming, many more communities joined, boosting membership to more than 50 charter communities. ACE's membership today stands at 72 communities and one public power district.

"There was a lot of unrest with the gas business in the state of Nebraska, cost-wise and distribution-wise - the cost was sky-rocketing," recalled Paul Markowski, utility superintendent for the City of Ord, Neb., an ACE charter member. "At that time

the local gas provider decided that they were going to come up with a choice program... a few of the communities got together and saw an opportunity within NMPP (Energy) of adding competition."

To get ACE off the ground as an organization, communities paid a

start-up fee, which was reimbursed to the communities after just five years.

"At that time, the city council and city fathers thought it was important to the city of Ord to provide competition for our gas supply to try and get cheaper (gas) for our community,"

MEAN Executive Committee approves decrease in wholesale rates for 2018-19

Targeted revenue requirement also decreases for new year


The Municipal Energy Agency of Nebraska (MEAN) Executive Committee in February approved a 1.2 percent decrease in MEAN's long-term wholesale electric energy rate and a 2.2 percent decrease in its overall targeted revenue requirement from its current year for its 54 long-term (Schedule M) wholesale power participants for fiscal year 2018-19. The new rate will take effect May 1.

The decreases in the energy rate and targeted revenue requirement are due largely to the decrease in the average cost of energy (purchased and produced) during MEAN's budget year. It is the third straight year MEAN has lowered its targeted revenue requirement, which is the total net revenue required to cover MEAN's cost of operation.

MEAN's wholesale electric rate structure includes a flat energy rate (usage) and a fixed cost recovery charge that allows MEAN to recover certain known costs and better handle energy usage volatility due to weather and other unpredictable factors. These two components are MEAN's primary sources of revenue.

Fixed Cost Recovery Charge

The Fixed Cost Recovery Charge is 41 percent of MEAN's



targeted revenue requirement. It covers certain known costs related to ownership of power resources, power contracts and operations. This charge is allocated to long-term (Schedule M) and 10-year (Schedule K) Participants based on each Participants' three-year historical average peak electric demand.

Accounting for certain known costs protects MEAN wholesale electric Participants from revenue volatility from energy sales caused by unpredictable factors such as weather-related usage fluctuations, unplanned resource outages, fuel costs and transmission congestion/outages.

Electric Energy Sales

This source of revenue makes up approximately 58 percent of MEAN's targeted revenue requirement. Unlike the fixed cost recovery charge, energy sales are highly variable as usage depends on consumer need, which varies due to weather, time of day, conservation, etc.

The MEAN Board and Management Committee annually reviews rates and charges to ensure operating revenues are sufficient to pay operating expenses, including aggregate debt service obligations, capital costs, as well as to have an adequate rate stabilization fund and sufficient cash reserves in accordance with policies approved by the MEAN Board.

100 percent renewable mandate fails in Colorado

A bill in the Colorado General Assembly (SB 18-064) requiring all electric utilities to derive their energy from 100 percent renewable sources by 2035 was recently post-

poned indefinitely by the body.

The Colorado Association of Municipal Utilities (CAMU) opposed the bill for several reasons. While Nebraska Municipal Power

Pool (NMPP) member communities are supportive of renewable measures, this bill included rate setting language pertaining to municipal net metering and violated the state constitution. NMPP supports each community's right to make this decision.

said Markowski.

"Sitting in on the start of it and looking at it now, there's no way we even dreamt we would still be in existence," he said. "We started from scratch and a lot of other communities liked what we were doing and then it progressively grew. Nowhere in our imagination we would have dreamt that we would have the membership that we do now."

In addition to providing competitive rates and local control

the Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust.

The growth of electric vehicles and concepts of electric vehicle charging ports will continue to be a major discussion in all the states. Watch for the Volkswagen funds to be used for charging ports on major corridors across Iowa, Nebraska, Wyoming and Colorado.

Iowa's Omnibus Energy Bill

In Iowa, NMPP is supporting SSB 3093/HSB 595, coined the Omnibus Energy Bill. This bill contains several provisions that impact municipal utilities, rural electric coops and investor-owned utilities. It adds municipal gas utilities to the provisions of Iowa measure 28F, allowing for joint financing of gas projects. The House and Senate subcommittees met on this bill in February.

Nebraska Senators weighing eminent domain, renewables

In Nebraska, state senators continue discussing renewable energy with a bill aiming to restrict electric utilities' eminent domain authority. LB 752 would prohibit Nebraska electric utilities from using eminent domain authority to obtain right of way on behalf of a third party accessing the infrastructure to sell electric energy. State law allows private companies to generate electricity in the state only if they use renewable technology such as solar panels or wind turbines.

Federal News

The Public Service or Utilities Commissions in NMPP states are investigating the impact the 2017 Federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act will have on privately owned utilities, subject to the states' jurisdiction.

Commissions are calling in privately owned electric, gas, water, sewer and solid waste facilities to track the tax savings resulting from the 2017 Federal Tax Act. Many are asking what the expected effect will be on revenue requirements, a detailed calculation of the impact of the Act on income calculation used in the last rate cases, or their recent income tax calculations.

to residents, ACE serves as an advocate on behalf of Choice Gas customers and provides a possible revenue stream back to Nebraska communities, instead of having profits go to out-of-state share-holders like an investor-owned gas supplier.

The ACE Board of Directors recently approved returning \$250,000 back to member communities, bringing the total revenue returned to Nebraska communities more than \$2 million. These funds have been used

over the years to fund a variety of community projects such as parks, playgrounds, youth programs and infrastructure improvements.

Through the years, natural gas suppliers competing in the Choice Gas program have come and gone, but ACE and its mission has remained a constant, serving as an example of communities working together in a grassroots effort to benefit consumers by ensuring competition, local control and keeping money in Nebraska communities.


2017 Typical Bill Survey of regional utilities completed

The Nebraska Municipal Power Pool (NMPP) completed its annual Typical Bill Survey for participating members and non-members. This is the 34th year NMPP has conducted the survey, which includes electric, water and wastewater retail rates. Of the 139 utilities participating this year, 115 are NMPP members and 24 are non-member utilities operating in surrounding areas. Participants provided billing information for rates effective through December 2017.

The electric survey results are arranged by Rate Service Classes. The typical bills include the appropriate "Production/ Energy Cost Adjustment" (PCA/ ECA) and Franchise Fee, when applicable.

The composite statistics presented reflect ranking of typical bills by utility for each rate service class and usage level.

The survey includes an alphabetical listing by utility



and their membership affiliation. The survey is prepared by NMPP's Engineering Services staff.
